



This half-term Mr. Harvey's class has been reading 'Commotion in the Ocean'. They have found out about lots of different sea creatures and have produced a lovely piece of display work on a creature of their choice.

<u>Science</u>

Classes NG and JB have been learning about Forces in Mr. Harvey's science lessons. Some of the investigations they have done include comparing the amount of grip which different shoes have; making tin foil boats and seeing how much weight they hold; making a density column from different liquids and testing the strength of different magnets.

Grow Moorlands Enterprise

Grow Moorlands is an enterprise founded by The Meadows which supports young people by providing opportunities for voluntary and work experience and pathways into future employment. Recently, four sixth formers, Tom, Andrew, Nathan and Ashley, under the Grow Moorlands umbrella, have been working in cooperation with our local housing association, Your Housing, to help tidy and renovate the gardens and grounds of their Belle Vue flats in Leek. So successful have their efforts been, that for the first time in seven years, there is now full occupancy in the flats. James Coates, Development Officer for Your Housing in Leek has been very impressed by the efforts of the students and is now offering an expansion of the scheme to their Eagle Mill flats in Leek. Great credit goes to the four for getting stuck into a tricky and challenging task with energy and enthusiasm. The scheme is projected to last into next autumn and will be a useful addition to the students' CV's as well as improving the lives and environment of the tenants of Belle Vue.

During the winter term Mrs Thomas' class have studied the story 'Survive the Savage Sea'. A true story of the survival of a local family from Warslow who were ship wrecked and survived on a raft in the middle of the Pacific Ocean for 37 days. Through this story, Class AT explored: the difference between 'wants and needs', empathy, team work, creative writing, how to understand and interpret different points of view.

Students have also been exploring WW1, we have looked at life in the trenches and read some real letters that were sent home by some of the soldiers. We explored, what it might have felt like to be one of those soldiers and what you might or might not want to write in a letter that you sent back home and why.

The Daisy Haye retirement flats on Ball Haye Road. They have tidied and planted in the bistro area and have been helping individual tenants who find the digging and lifting a bit too strenuous. They kindly offer us a drink and use of the facilities. It was good to see our efforts encouraging local people to sit and chat by the beds through the summer and autumn. We aim to continue to maintain this important floral bed in town with twice yearly planting.
